Picturesque Town With Bright Future

PALMER LAKE, June 5 —

Rogers M. McDonough is supposed to be retired, but he can't find time to take it easy.

"When people learn that we're from Palmer Lake, they ask 'Well, what in the World do you find to do there?'" he says. "Our problem is that we hardly have time to take care of the things that are already under way. We don't need to plan others."

McDonough is a retired Army lieutenant colonel who, like his wife, Mrs. Marian McDonough, has long had a fondness for

town south of Denver was where they would take up residence.

Active Roles

They moved into the home that had once been occupied by Mrs. McDonough's parents. Several times remodeled, it was built in 1884 as a clubhouse for one of the resort hotels that flourished in Palmer Lake at that time. It later served as a residence for the station agent, and for a time was the town's postoffice.

McDonough served two years on the town council and six years as mayor, retiring in April after declining to run again. He has had an active hand in about every civic endeavor since his Army retirement, as has Mrs. McDonough.

She is president of the Historical Society and the Pikes Peak Pen Women, is trustee of the Regional Library Board, does considerable writing and is proud of the part she played in establishing the Palmer Lake Community Library and Museum.

Founded in 1871

Palmer Lake had a strong cultural influence when it was founded in 1871 as a stopping point on Gen. William Jackson Palmer's Rio Grande Railroad. It still has a lot of culture—much more than many towns that are substantially larger.

It was this atmosphere that helped attract Palmer Lake's present mayor, Stanley Johnson, a Palmer Lake. When he left military service 13 years ago, they

Denver attorney who divides his working hours between his Denver law office and one in Palmer Lake.

"I'm spending more time here, because I find I can get more done," he says. "I don't have the distractions that I have in Denver."

Johnson says with sincerity, "I'm the mayor of one of the finest communities in the nation. I couldn't have found a better place to raise my four children. From our home, it is walking distance to school, the grocery store, the postoffice, the bus stop and the railroad station. We have the splendid services of the library, and on Sundays, as the bells of a favorite hymn ring in our mountain air, a short stroll brings us to our Little Log Church."

A daughter is enrolled in the nearby ballet conducted by Mrs. Ruth English, wife of an Air Force colonel. This is another of the cultural advantages of the area.

Yule Log Event

The town's best known community celebration is its annual Yule Log Ceremony, held the first Sunday before Christmas. President of the Yule Log Assn. is Kenneth McCall, who operates the McCall Mercantile and is agent for The Rocky Mountain News.

The Yule Log program began in 1934, and was designed for the community's young people. It attracted 30, but had such widespread interest that it was opened to adults the following year. Last year's observance at the Town Hall attracted 1500.

"Everybody in town is an unofficial member of the association," McCall said. "We're incorporated, but our only income goes for expenses of the Yule Log ceremony. It's gotten us more recognition than almost anything we could do."

Leading Citizens

Two of the town's leading busi-

tired 10 years ago as research director for the Givaudan Corp., an industrial firm headquartered in Geneva.

"My parents honeymooned here at the turn of the century and later bought a cottage here where I used to spend summers," said Dr. Carpenter. "When I retired, we moved back here and built our present home. Palmer Lake is a fine place to live."

Residents of the town have just voted a \$125,000 bond issue for school expansion. Palmer Lake and nearby Monument formed a Kiwanis Club three years ago which now numbers 40 members and sponsors an active Boy Scout program.

The museum and library, housed jointly in a 1-time railroad building donated by the Santa Fe Railroad, have proved two fine community assets. The Historical Society took the lead in securing the two agencies which opened in February 1964.

Among donations making the museum-library possible was \$500 from the Palmer Lake Home Demonstration Club. The museum has more than 100 historical items on display and more others

tary service 13 years ago, they agreed that the picturesque little

community faces a bright future. New homes are being constructed and land prices are increasing. The town has water resources far beyond its present needs, he says. Damage from last year's storm has been fully repaired.

Like the McDonoughs, the Fred Staebens are a retired military family pressed for time to take care of all the activities in which they're involved. When Fred retired as an Air Force lieutenant colonel in March 1963, the Staebens moved into their new home at the eastern outskirts of wooded Palmer Lake.

They call for five square dance groups in the area, including one each Saturday night at Palmer Lake, which attracts dancers from miles around. Mrs. Ruth Staeben heads the Little Art Group of Palmer Lake which meets each Wednesday.

The art group has held several exhibitions and will hold an outdoor show in August at the Staebens' corral, with proceeds going

Two of the town's leading business figures are Bert Tatman, manager of the Plateau Natural Gas Co. and town councilman in charge of the Water Department, and Elgin Meck, assistant fire chief and water commissioner and owner of Glenside Store.

After natural gas was brought to town in 1961, Tatman's company had 265 meters. It now has 455 and more business in sight. Tatman believes the town's present year-around population of 1000 and the summer population of 2000 will double in five years.

Meck, who has run his general store nine years, says business has increased every year. His volunteer fire department of 23 members is working to expand the fire house by adding a recreation room and quarters for a fire truck that is being donated by the U.S. Forest Service.

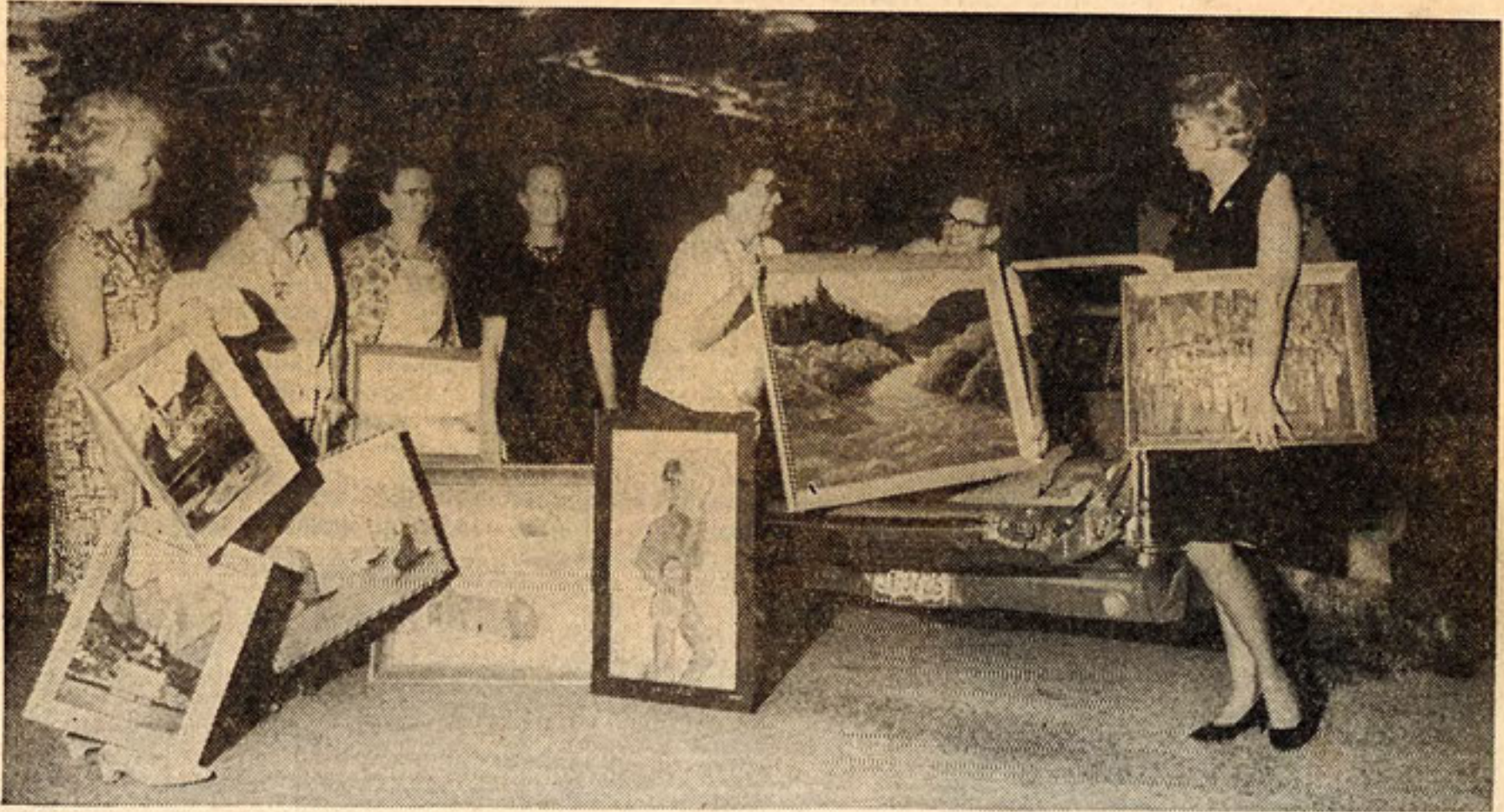

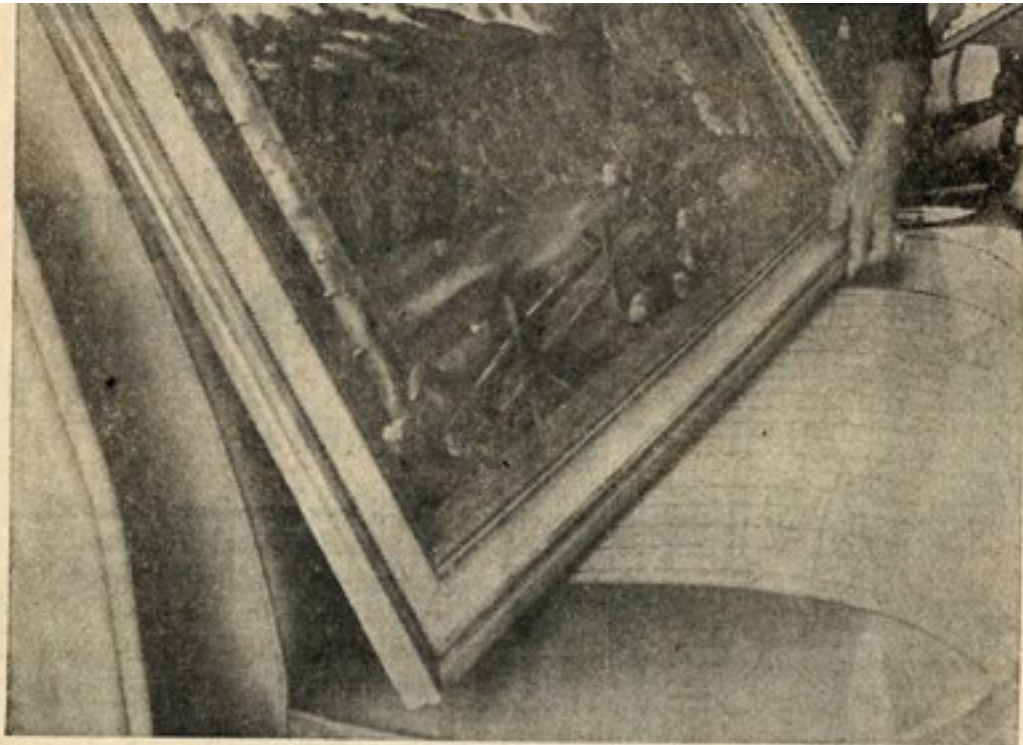

Railroad Depot Heads for Retirement

Railroad Depot Heads for Retirement

After welcoming travelers for more than 60 years, the Palmer Lake depot is doing a little traveling itself these days.

The ancient wooden structure, decorated with carved fancywork in the Victorian manner, has taken to flatbed truck and is being towed towards a final resting place in South Park.

Passenger stops in the mountain resort south of Denver were long a thing of the past when the Santa Fe closed the depot last year and donated it to a Palmer Lake youth group.

For several years, the station had been the office of the railroad's agent, whose only job consisted of dutifully relaying orders to the trains that passed but never stopped.

Offered Depot for Sale

When the youth group got it, however, its members had no way of getting the building off the railroad's property, so they placed an advertisement offering it for sale.

Denver advertising executive Shelton Fisher saw the ad and became intrigued with the depot's possibilities.

"Seven or eight months ago," he explains, "I finally got my mountain property paid off.

My wife and I thought we'd build something on it in about four or five years."

Fisher telephoned the group's director, who explained that he was offering it to the first buyer who showed up with \$100.

"Consider me airborne," Fisher told the man.

"Thirty-nine minutes later, we were down there. I saw it from the highway and told my wife to write out the check."

Fisher arrived at the director's home, only to find several other potential buyers standing around.

Handed Him the Check

"I stepped out of the car and handed him the check," Fisher says. "You could tell they were mad. One fellow almost conked me."

Fisher's plans call for moving the depot from Palmer Lake to his mountain property in South Park, a trip of 120 miles. To insure that the bulky building could safely travel the distance, however, he drove an estimated 800 miles on mountain roads searching for the right route, one that avoided low clearances and tight curves.

"I had to go all the way to the head of the Highway Department," he says, "and finally Charles Shumate gave his permission."

The selected route includes travel down the uncompleted lane of Highway 70, the Hampden Ave. extension, so as not to interfere with traffic.

Finding a mover was as difficult as finding a route. "I got a real run around with two house movers before I found this one," Fisher says. "This one" is Bob Waldorf, a young man who operates Ryberg-Waldorf House Movers Inc.

Idea Appealed to Him

Waldorf has agreed to move the old station at less than cost, Fisher says, "because the idea sort of appealed to him. He'd never met a man who bought a railroad station before."

Saturday, the station was trucked 25 miles from Palmer Lake to a farm outside of Sedalia, using backroads for most of the journey.

"Thursday," Fisher says, "we plan to hit the highway at 9 a.m." by Friday, the station should be over Kenosha Pass and into South Park, he adds.

Once there, it will be set up along with another railroad relic—a wooden caboose given to Fisher by the Colorado & Southern Railway (Burlington).

Fisher plans to invite orphans up to use his new cabin for weekends "as soon as I get heat and water into it."

"That's my hope, since I've had every break."

Caboose Will Sleep 10

The station is divided into two large rooms which will become a living room and kitchen, complete with an authentic pot bellied stove. The caboose, when it's fixed up, will sleep 10. Both structures will be rehabilitated to look as authentic as possible and will be joined by a passageway.

In an era when castoff railroad coaches of ten end up as chicken coops decaying in some

barnyard, the old Palmer Lake station could do worse.

The Rio Grande Railroad's Palmer Lake station, which once rested on prime land adjacent to the lake, was torn down more than 10 years ago without ceremony.

But after trembling to the thunder of a thousand trains as they tramped up the divide and down into Denver and thawing the bones of countless travelers with its simmering coal stove, the old Santa Fe depot looks awkward and forlorn perched high on a flat-bed behind a truck.

As a final sardonic touch, a sticker in the window promises the ticket-buyer who will never arrive: "Midwestern Bank Card Welcome Here."



They don't build them like that anymore: Carved fancywork harkens back to days when even a small-town depot could be elegant.
